From our Pastor

"See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are." - 1 John 3:1

My favorite part of the day is in the early morning before anyone in my family is awake and it's just me and our dog, Jojo, outside walking around in the field behind our house. The air is cold and crisp. The fog hovers over the grass. The sky is that perfect mix of brilliant orange and purple. The other morning, I felt overwhelmed with the magnificent beauty of it all. Immediately, my mind started to think about how quickly the colors of the sky would change, how the temperature would begin to rise, and how the fog would lift. Then I began having some of those existential questions that I think we all ask from time to time: What am I REALLY doing here? How is it that I am part of this beautifully rich world? How can there be so much calm and beauty in one moment, and the next be filled with pain and grief? Who am I? What does it" all "mean? Yes – all of this flooded my mind before 6:00am on a chilly October morning, standing in a field wearing my pajamas. And, as I leave that moment in the field, I begin my day. And like you, we never know what the day will bring.

I could go on and on... I think it is easy to lose sight of who we are and what it is we're really doing. Does it matter? Does it make a difference? Do I matter?

When the fog lifts and the sky changes color, we need to remind ourselves; "See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are."

Easier said than done, I know. However, I can tell you with full confidence that repeating this mantra has a much more powerful and positive affect than all of the existential questions and worries that we allow to fill our minds.


This message from John is truth. It is not abstract. We are loved by God. We are God's own.



<u>Lutheran World Relief</u> Ingathering and Dedication September 24, 2023

Thank you to Sue Hettinger who helps to lay the quilts together each month. Thank you to Sandy Smith who sews tops and does all the binding of the quilts. Her daughter, Andrea McAllister has begun to sew tops and Carol Lebo continues to sew tops. Anna Ruth Burkholder continues to give us cut squares. We thank her for her partnership in this project.

Thank you also to St. Luke members for your sheets, mattress pads, blankets, material, crochet yarn and batting that is purchased. The cost of batting has gone from \$60.00 to \$120.00 a roll. We get 18-20 quilts from our roll. If you are willing to make a donation it would be appreciated. WELCA pays for the batting.

This year the ladies made 104 quilts. It cost LWR \$2.25 for the shipping of each quilt. Your donation helps to pay the cost. Last year 220,000 quilts traveled to 19 countries. Thank you to the following people who lifted and carried 40 lb. boxes from curbs to truck to larger trucks: Sue DeLong, Mike DeLong, Paul DeLong, Sharon Reber, Mike Reber, Judy Werner, Jake Werner, Judy Plummer, Anna Mae Grubb, and Andrea McAllister. They carried a total of 408 quilts, 603 Personal Care Kits, 12 Fabric Kits, 14 Baby Care Kits and 1,028 School Kits.

A special thank you to **Plain and Fancy** and their volunteers, Scott Schollenberger and Will Haverstroh for driving, carrying and stacking the boxes onto the Plain and Fancy truck. They drove from St. Luke Lutheran Schaefferstown to Salem Lutheran Lebanon to St. Marks Annville and then the next day to Bergstrasse Ephrata. Members of Bergstrasse Evangelical Lutheran Church transport the boxes to New Windsor, Maryland Lutheran World Relief warehouse to be distributed worldwide.
